

Summary

On the Line: Insights from a Mixed Methods Study of the RRAAM Hotline from 2021 to 2023

This report follows from **RRAAM hotline research in 2020**, seeking insight into the experiences of hotline users and para-counselors in seeking and providing information on safe abortion access in Malaysia between January 2021 and December 2023.

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Key Facts & Findings

Structural Barriers to Access

Although legally permissible through The Penal Code Section 312, access to abortion in Malaysia remains impeded by structural barriers, such as:

- A widespread lack of regulation and information, leading to a higher risk of exploitation and variability.
- Significantly fewer service providers outside of urban areas and sensitized service providers overall.
- De-registration of medical abortion pills, leading to a higher risk of scams and/or misuse.

Between 2021 and 2023, there was a threefold increase in the number of users aged 35 years and above, from 110 clients in 2021 to 342 clients in 2023.

Many cited **medical issues**, **poor pregnancy spacing**, **and economic constraints** as the most common factors in their decision to have an abortion.

Navigating Stigma

Internal and external stigma remains one of the most significant challenges for people seeking abortion access and care in Malaysia.

The pervasive stigma surrounding abortion calls for stigma-free and non-judgmental avenues for providing abortion services and care.

Services Outside of Abortion

Users with minimal knowledge of reproductive processes sought the hotline out as a source of sexuality education.

For non-abortion related issues, users often enquired about where and how to seek sexual and reproductive healthcare services, such as contraceptive access and STI treatment, with a priority for non-judgmental service providers.

Shifting Demographics



2 out of 5 hotline users already had at least one child.

The Role of the Hotline and Increasing Its Capacity

The full-time hiring of the RRAAM coordinator in 2022 led to an 86% increase in hotline users.

For many users, the hotline was the first and only source of accurate and non-judgmental information about safe abortion access that they encountered.

Recommendations

- Sustain and scale national abortion support infrastructures - Provision of sustained funding for community-based, nation-wide initiatives such as the RRAAM hotline allows for more widespread access to life-saving, stigma-free information and support.
- Reform legal, policy, and regulatory frameworks - Re-register abortion pills to mitigate risks from unregulated online vendors and scammers and address regulatory gaps that continue to cause vulnerability to exploitation.
- Strengthen access to CSE for all Implement robust comprehensive sexuality education (CSE) programs to equip individuals and communities with knowledge regarding reproductive choices to prevent unintended pregnancy and baby dumping.
- Challenge stigma and bias through a holistic SRHR approach - Shift towards a reproductive justice approach that affirms the autonomy, choice, and dignity of abortion seekers and addresses the unmet need for non-judgemental SRHR services across all demographics.














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
